This Month's Meeting: Dinner and a Movie Night


The Four Lakes Scuba Club is replacing its July meeting with a dinner and movie night featuring The Life Aquatic with Steve Zissou.

Liveaboard Safety

With the news several weeks ago of <u>yet another liveaboard</u> <u>sinking in Egypt's Red Sea</u>, it's always a good idea to consider your safety when you go on a trip aboard a liveaboard or dive boat. Liveaboards are a fun way to pack lots of dives in at pristine locations.

You should get a safety briefing prior to departing, including description of evacuation protocols, location of safety equipment, and crew night safety watch. Make sure they show you all of the exits so you can be sure emergency hatches can be opened and aren't blocked. The briefing should be professional and comprehensive. Research the operator online before you go; many publish their protocols online. Here's the Red Sea Aggressor's for example.

Pay attention to policies about charging electronics. Do they prohibit charging electronics in cabins when unoccupied? Is there a designated charging station? Are drinks or wet towels frequently set near that charging station? Are the plugs rusted?

Consider keeping your most important small valuables in a tiny dry bag in your cabin, as well as a small flashlight (or smartphone) so you can grab and go if an emergency happens in the middle of the night and don't waste any time

looking for things.

As for safety equipment to bring on the dive, there are a number of options (safety sausage, signal mirror, light) that each have advantages. From <u>this old Scubaboard thread</u>, tell the crew or other divers what you're carrying, since it changes the techniques that searchers use to look for you and can improve their effectiveness.

Lastly, consider the difference between dive insurance and travel insurance, and strongly consider having both. See <u>this</u> <u>DAN article</u> for more information.
